

BRIDGING PROGRAM IN SPEECH LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY

Are you:

- Interested in becoming a speech language pathologist, but not a speech language pathology major?
- Changing careers and need to meet the requirements for graduate school?
- Interested in becoming a licensed SLPA?

This post-baccalaureate program increases access to graduate training programs in speech-language pathology by creating a “bridge” for students with undergraduate degrees in other fields or for students who lack one or more required courses for entry to a graduate program.

Advantages of the Bridge Program:

- Prepares you for CSD/SLP graduate programs through a comprehensive prerequisite program
- Clinical opportunities on campus before you start your master’s program
- Begin developing meaningful professional connections
- Can lead to licensure as an SLPA in the state of Indiana

Career Prospects

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) projects that careers in speech-language pathology will grow much faster than the average job growth rate—increasing by 25% from 2019 to 2029. Speech language pathologists work in various settings;

- Elementary, middle and high schools
- Home health agencies and rehabilitation centers
- Skilled nursing facilities
- Hospitals and outpatient clinics
- Offices of ear, nose and throat doctors

Our curriculum is designed to provide you with the foundation to either start working as a speech language pathology assistant in Indiana or continue on to graduate school to become a speech language pathologist who can practice just about anywhere.

Curriculum

This program is designed to allow students who have earned a bachelor’s degree in another discipline to complete most* of the prerequisite courses in speech language pathology for graduate school in one year (fall, spring, summer). Saint Mary’s College has both the course work and clinical practicum that allows you get ahead in the field. Our curriculum combines academic theory, practical applications, and clinical experience

all while you develop meaningful connections with your professors and other speech language pathologists.

These bridge courses, often called leveling courses, ensure that all students beginning a master’s program in speech language pathology have equal levels of preparation.

After the two-semester sequence, you will have completed the prerequisite coursework necessary to apply to most graduate programs in speech-language pathology. Completing the sequence does not guarantee admission into Saint Mary’s graduate program in speech-language pathology.

Enrollment in the Bridge Program

Tuition and Fees

- The program is a fixed \$12,000 for students taking 14-33 credit hours of pre-SLP work
- Students who have 13 or less credit hours to complete will take them at the rate of \$890/credit hour
- Additional fees may apply for specific courses or course requirements, like a background check.
- Only pay for the courses you need.

Financial Aid

Typically, federal financial aid is not available to non-degree seeking students. A limited number of partial scholarships will be awarded each year.

Admission to Master's Program from the Bridge Program:

- a. Completed the following prerequisite courses - department requirements: SLP 220, 230, 240, 310, 330, 334, 340, 350, 412, 420, 450.
- b. Completed the following prerequisite courses / equivalent requirements that meet CAA standards: biological science course, physical science course, intro to psychology course, psychology course that covers lifespan, and statistics.
- c. Earned at least a GPA of 3.25 in SLP foundation courses (SLP 220, 230, 240, 310, 330).
- d. A minimum overall cumulative grade point average of 3.0.
- e. Meet the essential functions required to practice as a speech language pathologist
- f. Successfully completed a criminal background check, fingerprint check, and drug screen before entering the MS SLP.
